

Applied Sustainable Ranching | WL Campus Program Information Package 2022-23

Program Description

The Applied Sustainable Ranching program is the first of its kind in British Columbia. This program allows students to work with livestock on active ranches and learn how you can help create a sustainable, environmentally friendly agricultural industry. In-class and/or online courses teach you the business of ranching and land management through business, communications, marketing, and economics courses, as well as natural resources, science and technology. The tools you gain will allow you to build and manage a diversified and resilient ranching operation or agricultural business in BC, across Canada and around the world.

What to Expect

- Participate in real-life ranching operations in BC
- Gain employment-ready experience
- Understand how ranch and rangeland ecosystems react to management decisions
- Understand livestock needs and how to best manage the natural environment to produce nutritious proteins to feed the world
- Learn to design ranching enterprises that fit the environment and resources while providing a return on investment
- Experience a program that is built in BC to address the needs of the local ranching environment
- Learn to develop and fine-tune enterprise management around the unique market opportunities in your region

Students are not required to live in Williams Lake to take this program. Due to the flexible blended learning model, students living and working on any ranch in BC or internationally can enroll in the program without having to move away from home. Students may attend the weekly seminars in person or via video conference.

Application Deadline

Applications are accepted until the program has reached capacity; there is no set application deadline.

After the program is full, completed applications will continue to be accepted and placed on a waitlist until the start of the program. Waitlisted applicants will be offered a seat on a first-applied, first-qualified basis should a seat in the program become available before the start of the program.

Admission Requirements

Admission is limited. Admission is offered on a first-applied, first-qualified (completed application and all requirements met) basis. It is important to complete your application as soon as possible to ensure the best chance of securing a seat.

Educational Requirements

- 1. Grade 11 (or equivalent), grade 12 preferred, or mature student status
- 2. Foundations of Mathematics 11, with a minimum C
- 3. English Studies 12/English First Peoples 12 with a minimum 67% (or equivalent), or successful completion of the ACCUPLACER assessment (see below)

Additional Requirements

- A good working knowledge of Microsoft Word and Excel
- Access to a reliable Internet source
- A suitable work placement on a working ranch.



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Admission of Mature Students

Any applicant at least 19 years of age with a minimum two years out of school lacking requirements for a program or course will be considered for mature student status. Although the grade level requirement will be waived for students classified as mature, individual course prerequisites listed for the program or course being applied for must be met.

What if I don't meet the program requirements?

If you don't meet the minimum requirement in English Studies 12, you can write the ACCUPLACER English assessment in place of upgrading your English course. The ACCUPLACER costs \$39.90 to write. Alternatively, if you are not successful on the ACCUPLACER or you prefer to upgrade your English course, please meet with the TRU Williams Lake Academic Advisor to create your individual upgrading plan.

Permanent Resident Students

If you are a Canadian Permanent Resident, and/or you did not graduate from a BC or Canadian high school, you may be required to meet and/or obtain the minimum English Language Proficiency requirement through additional coursework or approved English placement assessment. In general: If your high school and/or post-secondary was completed in a country where English is not the official language, you will likely have to complete one of the following:

- Assessment: TOEFL (iBT: 88+ with no sections below 2.0), IELTS (6.5+ with no bands below 6.0) or Pearson Test of English. Please note: English placement assessment likely needs to be completed in either Vancouver, Kamloops, Prince George, or another city.
- Additional Coursework: English as a Second Language (ESAL) course. Please note: TRU Williams Lake does not
 offer any ESAL courses.

How to Apply

- 1. Apply online at tru.ca/williamslake/registration.html or use the paper application form at tru.ca/campus/admissions/apply
- 2. Pay the application fee of \$31.02. Your application will not be processed until the application fee is paid.
- 3. Submit official high school transcripts and any post-secondary transcript(s), before the application deadline, to:

BC high school applicants and graduates can submit their official transcripts through the Student Transcripts Service (STS).

Applicants are required to submit official transcripts from all post-secondary institutions attended. If you are currently attending another post-secondary institution, you must submit an official transcript at the time of your application. Should you have courses in progress, you will be required to submit a final official transcript at completion of these courses.

You will be contacted by admissions via email within 2-3 weeks of submission of your online application regarding next steps. Students who are admitted will be required to pay a commitment fee of \$500 prior to registration in courses.

Payment Deadlines: Tuition and student fees are due the last Friday in August for the Fall semester and the first Friday in January for the Winter semester.

Re-Application

If you were not accepted, or applied but did not attend last year, you must submit a NEW application and contact the Admissions Office to ensure all required documentation is still on file and complete.
